So as I was preparing to write my little blurb for the newsletter, I realized that there is only 19 more Fridays until winter starts. Now a touch of panic sets in when thinking about all the things that need to happen to prepare for another snowmobiling season with the Winter Knights. Thankfully, the new ride schedule is done and available for you to view on the Winter Knights' website, along with the addition of the Featured Photo Of The Month. This is something all club members can participate in by joining our Facebook Group page and submitting a snowmobiling photo each month to be voted on by the Group members. The winning photo each month will be featured on the home page of the website and become the profile picture for our Facebook page. Search and Rescue (SAR)

Summer was looking pretty good. Nice comfortable temperatures, blue skies with the one week exception of smoke in the air, mostly from Canada and no "call outs" since the Fairfield fiasco in February (see the Winter Newsletter for details). Then the proverbial "stuff hit the fan" with four call outs in less than three weeks.

The first was Tuesday, May 14th at 8:am involving a 69 year old male missing in the vicinity of Medical Lake. Actually, the search area was between Medical Lake and West Medical Lake involving a considerable amount of State Hospital property. Subject reportedly suffered bouts of depression and was last seen with a whiskey bottle in hand. Also, a note was left for the family allegedly stating "leaving for good....goodbye". With all the water in the area it would be easy to jump to a conclusion of where to focus search efforts, however, a ground and ATV search was conducted with Sherriff Department boats covering the shoreline. Major portions of the ground area were thick with brush and craggy rock formations which presented numerous challenges to a comprehensive search.

Without success the search was terminated at dark. However, a second 8:am call out was initiated the following Saturday, May 18th essentially in the same area, but was again unsuccessful and terminated at 2:30pm. То date subject's the whereabouts remain unknown. As side note....bodies can remain underwater for 2-3 months depending on composition and water temperature.

You may recall from local "breaking news" reports about the two missing school girls (ages 9 and 12) that walked away from school grounds in the Dishman Hills area on Friday, May 24th around noon. Actually, it was five girls that left the school grounds, however, three were found on a nearby trail rather Sheriff's helicopter quickly. and local law enforcement being unable to locate the two remaining girls, a call out initiated at 3:34pm. Fortunately, the girls were located shortly afterward and the search was officially terminated at 4:43pm.

Thursday, May 30th at 9:17am a call out was initiated for a 30 year old female missing in the vicinity of Wildflower

Road off Hwy 195 just south Hangman Valley Golf Subject reportedly Course. history of over had a "self-medication" and walked away from her parent's home at 9:pm the prior Tuesday evening. The housing area is gated with 5 - 10+ acre lots and numerous walking trails. The subject was found deceased approximately 10 feet off one of the walking trails sitting with her back against a tree. Search was at 11:22am. terminated however, a few personnel and yours truly stayed around waiting for the Medical Examiner and to assist in body recovery with the ATV/UTV. All personnel were released and departed the area at 1:30pm. lt was later determined the subject died from a drug overdose.

Lastly, a call out Sunday, June 9th was initiated at 8:20pm with very limited information; (continued on next page)

that being "missing person at 2400 Craig" which happens to be south of Airway Heights. Normally a better description (age, sex) and address is provided and rarely is a search commenced right at the start of nighttime unless it involves a child and/or life threatening freezing temperatures. For me at best it takes 30 minutes to gather gear, change into appropriate clothing, hookup the trailer and load the UTV. Since most call outs seem to occur south of Spokane and living 14+ miles north, it takes at least an hour driving time to get through town. Fortunately, the call out was

terminated 30 minutes later which did not cause too much turmoil and was definitely appreciated. Spokane County SAR protocols prior to a text message county wide call out are extensive and detailed. Primarily they involve interviews. situation assessment and a hasty search prior to a full blown call out. Deputy Shultz is the county SAR Coordinator/Incident Commander and was vacationing in Montana at the time, hence; the premature ill-timed call and out. Hopefully, lessons were learned and similar future actions won't be repeated.

In just two short months we will start another September cycle of Winter Knight's club SAR Team meetings and Training Meetings. recognize that local snowmobiling is probably 2 - 3 months beyond that so I recommend that team members, if you have not done so already, consider your medical taking equipment off the sled and place it in your most used POV. You never know when you may come across a situation where your training equipment and may needed.
